Dear Parents, Carers and Pupils,

I bring you news of an exciting competition that the Modern Foreign Languages department is organising. We are inviting both you and your children to enter.



For the competition, the aim is to use the **Duolingo** app or <u>website</u> to learn a language. You can continue learning a language you are already learning, and you can be learning more than one language. The winner in each category will be the person who has gained the most XP, or Experience Points, within Duolingo by 9am on Monday 21<sup>st</sup> February 2022. The winner in the Parents category will receive a £20 Amazon voucher; there will also be prizes for the other categories. Duolingo is free of charge to use.

Parents and pupils can choose which languages to learn. Perhaps you wish to support your child learning the French, German and Spanish that we offer here at CamVC; maybe you wish to explore a less obvious language such as Swahili, Vietnamese or Hungarian. Now travel restrictions are easing, you may be eyeing up some foreign travel; if learning a language was a lockdown project or a new year's resolution, our competition might just give you that added impetus! Pupils should sign up with their name and school email address so that the lucky winner can be given their prize.

Some Duolingo features are disabled to ensure participants' privacy and safety: you will not be able to participate in discussions, make friend requests, follow other participants or participate in leagues. The competition organisers will be able to see participants' names and progress until the close of the competition, and will be able to see the emails participants used to sign up. Reproductive health services, survey for people with a uterus under 25 from Public Health Cambridgeshire County Council

We are undertaking a Sexual and Reproductive health needs assessment of the local population in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, with a focus on Reproductive health.

Reproductive health services can include provision of contraception, abortion care, chlamydia screening, management of heavy periods, relationships and sex education, and management of sexual problems.

We are particularly interested in the views of girls/women and people with a uterus, under 25 years, as we know they are a group who have a higher need for services and have been particularly affected by the Covid-19 pandemic. The survey is most relevant to those over 15 years.

All responses are anonymous. We will also be running focus groups after the questionnaire; young people have the option to take part in these if they wish, by leaving their details at the end of the survey. The results from the survey will be used to help review how current services are meeting the needs of young people, and to improve services going forwards.

Last academic year we hosted public lectures in the early evenings at school, which had been very well attended. # A quick reminder to all parents, carers and students of the health and safety rules in PE lessons.

Students should not be wearing earrings or any jewellery in their PE lessons. The covering of earrings with tape is not a sufficient safety measure; students should be fully removing all earrings in order to participate in their practical PE lessons.

Additionally, long nails, acrylics and nail extensions also pose a significant health and safety issue during PE. Please ensure all long nails or acrylics are cut short or removed for the start of term.

These rules are to keep everyone safe and we thank you for your support with ensuring students can abide by them.

# BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS



#### Noor-un-Nissa Inayat Khan by Sufiya

#### Ahmed

Based on true events, this is the thrilling story of British-Indian World War Two heroine, Noor-un-Nissa Inayat Khan. It's 1940 and hundreds of families are being forced to flee Nazi-occupied France. Noor refuses to stand by while Nazi forces invade her home and terrorise her people, so she travels to England and signs up to join the war efforts, despite her mother's wishes. It isn't long before her talents are noticed, and she is chosen by Winston Churchill to sneak back into France as an undercover agent. Noor returns home - but this time, as a secret agent... Can Noor keep her identity hidden, report her findings back to London and help the Allies win the war? *(Available from the School Library)* 



#### Don't Touch my Hair by Emma Dabiri

This book is about why black hair matters and how it can be viewed as a blueprint for decolonisation. Over a series of wry, informed essays, Emma Dabiri takes us from precolonial Africa, through the Harlem Renaissance, Black Power and on to today's Natural Hair Movement, the Cultural Appropriation Wars and beyond. Uncovering sophisticated indigenous mathematical systems in black hairstyles, alongside styles that served as secret intelligence networks leading enslaved Africans to freedom, *Don't Touch My Hair* proves that far from being only hair, black hairstyling culture can be understood as an allegory for black oppression and, ultimately, liberation. #### <u>Lateness</u>

The school starts with a form registration at 8.40 am. Pupils are expected to be in their form room by 8.35 am. Any pupil who arrives after this time is registered as late and minutes late will be recorded.

Pupils can access the school Library from 8am in the morning and their social areas from 8:15am. The school gates are closed at 8:40am and any pupil arriving after this time should sign in at Reception and a 'Late' mark will usually be given unless there are exceptionally circumstances, which we are made aware of prior to their arrival.

A pupil who arrives after 9.00am will be marked as an unauthorised absent for the morning session unless they have a genuine reason for lateness i.e. medical appointment. If a child arrives late to school due to a medical appointment, a copy of the appointment card should be supplied to the school, prior to, or on their arrival. In this case the absence will be recorded as an authorised absence.

It is the duty of parents to ensure that children attend school regularly and punctually. This encourages habits of good timekeeping and lessens any possible classroom disruption.

Where pupils are continually arriving after registers close at 9am, their attendance will be monitored and may result in a Penalty Notice being issued.

Please contact your <u>child's year team</u> if you have any concerns or if there are circumstances the school needs to be aware of that are having an influence on your child attending school punctually.

#### Medical Appointments

If your child is going to be absent from school due to a prearranged medical appointment, we ideally need notification of this 2 school days in advance. Please email

thecollege@cambournevc.org with the date and time of the appointment and if

possible, a copy of the appointment letter/card.

All pupils leaving early for appointments need to be collected by a parent to sign them out through our main Reception.

#### Planned Absence Request

For any planned absence which is not a medical appointment, please complete a <u>planned ab</u>-<u>sence request form</u>. If possible, please submit this form two weeks before the absence.

Why should my child take part in weekly screening?

Tested

- One third of infected individuals have no symptoms and unknowingly spread coronavirus infection. Community LFD testing is one method to help identify and then isolate those infected. This helps reduce the risk for others in the wider community who are more at risk of infection such as the elderly and those who have underlying health conditions, contacts that students and students families have outside of school.

- LFD testing is voluntary, and we respect any decision surrounding this however we would like to encourage this as much as possible

#### The weekly process

- Pupils should test on a **WEDNESDAY** and **SUNDAY** each week
- Results should be entered into TestRegister at <u>TestRegister.co.uk</u>

#### Changes to the self-isolation period for those who test positive for COVID-19

From Monday 17 January, people who are self-isolating with COVID-19 will have the option to reduce their isolation period after 5 full days if they test negative with a lateral flow device (LFD) test **on both day 5 and day 6 and they do not have a temperature**. For example, if they test negative on the morning of day 5 and the morning of day 6, they can return to their education immediately on day 6.

The first test must be taken no earlier than **day 5 of the self-isolation period**, and the second must be taken the following day. All test results should be <u>reported to NHS Test and Trace</u>.

If the result of either of their tests is positive, they should continue to self-isolate until they get negative results from two LFD tests on consecutive days or until they have completed 10 full days of self-isolation, whichever is earliest.

Anyone who is unable to take LFD tests or anyone who continues to have a temperature will need to complete the full 10 day period of self-isolation.

Further <u>information on self-isolation for those with COVID-19</u> is available. Please let us know the details of this by emailing <u>thecollege@cambournevc.org</u> making sure the full name of the student and their tutor group is included with the date, symptoms and the test undertaken.

If your child has **lost an item of uniform**, please ask them to check with their **Year team office** in the first instance, or please **email <u>thecollege@cambournevc.org</u>** so that we can arrange for your child to check our unnamed items.

If your child needs a coat/jacket and would like to look through our unnamed items to find something suitable for them, please ask them to go to their Year team office or email <u>the College</u>.

Combined Minds is an app for parents and carers developed for teenage mental health charity Stem4 by Clinical Psychologists. The app aims to help families and friends support young people with their mental health.

Combined Minds use a 'strength based approach' which focuses on the positive attributes of the person and builds on resourcefulness and resilience. The app helps families to find ways to provide the right environment to help individuals they support affect their own change.

The app includes providing further information on certain needs such as anxiety and digital addiction as well as offering ways of accessing further help and useful suggestions of 'things you can do in the moment' to help support the young person.

#### What is safeguarding?

- Protecting children
- Preventing harm to a child

This includes a variety of different aspects. We are here to help your child make good choices but also support them if they make a mistake.

We work with individual students, their families and external agencies.

#### What do we do at CamVC to safeguard your child?

• **Staff are vigilant** – staff are very good at noticing small changes and listening to the concerns of those in our care. Tutors are well placed in this process, however all staff play an active role in this.

• **Designated Team** – we have a specific team of people working each day to address concerns raised by staff, pupils, parents and external agencies. This team works to make sure concerns are addressed and the appropriate support is advised

• **Pupil Voice** - we encourage pupils to speak to us or raise their concerns via the 'Report a Concern' button on their iPad
