TARGET OXBRIDGE/TRINITY COLLEGE PROGRAMME FOR YEAR 10 STUDENTS

Application Deadline: Sunday 20th February 2022.

Target Oxbridge is a <u>free programme that aims to help Black African and Caribbean students and students of mixed race with Black African and Caribbean heritage increase their chances of getting into the Universities of Oxford or Cambridge. Since launching in 2012, Target Oxbridge has helped over 200 students to secure Oxbridge offers.</u>

This free online programme will provide students the opportunity to gain an early insight into life at Cambridge and how to secure a Cambridge place.

WHAT DOES IT INVOLVE?

The programme will consist of four online webinars, taking place once a month between April and July 2021. Students will have the chance to hear from Black Oxford and Cambridge students and graduates, the Target Oxbridge team, and the Trinity College, Cambridge team. The webinars will cover:

- What Oxbridge is really like and what tutors are looking for
- How to prepare for an Oxbridge application
- How degree subject choice can affect career options
- A mini lecture followed by a Q&A session with a Cambridge tutor

HOW TO APPLY

The programme is open to UK-based state school students (or those on a full scholarship at an independent school) in Year 10 and who identify as Black African and Caribbean, or mixed race with Black heritage. The students accepted onto the programme will be predicted at least three GCSEs at grade 7, or will have the potential to achieve these grades but be in need of additional motivation and inspiration.

Dear Parents/Carers,

I am writing to share some information with you regarding 'Speakers <u>for Schools'</u> which is an organisation that provides access to a wide range of work experience opportunities, with varied leading companies and organisations.



Below you will find information about 'Speakers for schools' for your consideration. Please do also visit the Speakers for Schools website for more detailed information. You can find Speakers for Schools' Safeguarding Policy Statement and Safeguarding FAQs attached in the school post email.



Please do have a look through all the information provided, and if you're happy, please do discuss the programme with your child and encourage them to register for an account. Once registered, students will be able to access a portal where they can search and apply for a wide range of work experience opportunities. Opportunities include virtual work experience programmes, insight days and face to face work experience placements (when applicable). Opportunities take place on different dates throughout the year, so students should take note of the advertised dates and ensure that they are available to attend. We will share new opportunities with students where they arise, but full information will only be accessible through registration.

Students will need to apply for each opportunity. The application usually consists of a few interview questions, for example 'Please tell me about a time that you achieved something that you didn't think you could'. There are limited places for opportunities, so students should take their time to answer the questions thoughtfully, and to the best of their ability to put themselves in the best position for a successful application.

Before the application can be released to the potential 'employer', Cambourne Village College is required to confirm your child's personal details (details used for registration) and your parental consent (for your child to participate in the activity).

As we are sharing full details of this programme with parents/carers only, and sharing only limited information with students (rather, directing students to speak to parents/carers for full information) generally, where a student has submitted an application via Speakers for Schools; we will assume that parental consent has been provided. We will contact parent/carers individually for consent where an application requires discussion (e.g. it is a face to face placement, there are student SEN requirements, or the programme takes place during school time).

If your child is successful in securing a place on a virtual work experience programme or virtual insight event, it is always important to be mindful of online safety. Please ensure that your child does not share any personal information throughout the experience. Many of the virtual work experience opportunities and events on offer are likely to include student engagement with organisation representatives and employees. This is a reminder that all communication should take place via the prescribed chat functions and only during the event/opportunity itself. If the organisers are intending to use both first and surnames throughout the week,; students should be extra vigilant about disclosing any further personal, identifiable information.

Reproductive health services, survey for people with a uterus under 25 from Public Health Cambridgeshire County Council

We are undertaking a Sexual and Reproductive health needs assessment of the local population in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, with a focus on Reproductive health.

Reproductive health services can include provision of contraception, abortion care, chlamydia screening, management of heavy periods, relationships and sex education, and management of sexual problems.

We are particularly interested in the views of girls/women and people with a uterus, under 25 years, as we know they are a group who have a higher need for services and have been particularly affected by the Covid-19 pandemic. The survey is most relevant to those over 15 years.

All responses are anonymous. We will also be running focus groups after the questionnaire; young people have the option to take part in these if they wish, by leaving their details at the end of the survey. The results from the survey will be used to help review how current services are meeting the needs of young people, and to improve services going forwards.

We appreciate your help in informing your children about this survey and encouraging engagement.

Last academic year we hosted public lectures in the early evenings at school, which had been very well attended. 

Duolingo Languages Competition open to parents and pupils

For the competition, the aim is to use the <u>Duolingo</u> app or <u>website</u> to learn a language. You can continue learning a language you are already learning, and you can be learning more than one language. The winner in each category will be the person who has gained the most XP, or Experience Points, within Duolingo by 9am on Monday 21st February 2022. The winner in the Parents category will receive a £20 Amazon voucher; there will also be prizes for the other categories. Duolingo is free of charge to use.

Parents and pupils can choose which languages to learn. Perhaps you wish to support your child learning the French, German and Spanish that we offer here at CamVC; maybe you wish to explore a less obvious language such as Swahili, Vietnamese or Hungarian. Now travel restrictions are easing, you may be eyeing up some foreign travel; if learning a language was a lockdown project or a new year's resolution, our competition might just give you that added impetus! Pupils should sign up with their name and school email address so that the lucky winner can be given their prize.

Some Duolingo features are disabled to ensure participants' privacy and safety: you will not be able to participate in discussions, make friend requests, follow other participants or participate in leagues. The competition organisers will be able to see participants' names and progress until the close of the competition, and will be able to see the emails participants used to sign up. 
Some more thoughts on resilience

A quick reminder to all parents, carers and students of the health and safety rules in PE lessons.






BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS



I, Ada by Julia Gray

Ada Byron is rich and clever, but she longs to be free. Free to explore all the amazing ideas that come to her imagination, like flying mechanical horses and stories inspired by her travels. Free to find love and passion beyond the watchful gaze of her mother and governesses. And free to learn the full truth about her father, the notorious Lord Byron. Then Ada meets a man whose invention might just change the world - and he needs her visionary brilliance to bring it to life... A wonderfully witty and poignant portrayal of the young life of Ada Lovelace, the 19th-century mathematician who is hailed as the world's first computer programmer. Women In Science by Rachel Ignotofsky

This volume highlights the contributions of fifty notable women to the STEM fields of science, technology, engineering and mathematics, from both the ancient and modern worlds. The extraordinary women profiled include well-known figures like the physicist and chemist Marie Curie, as well as lesser-known pioneers such as Katherine Johnson, the African-American mathematician who calculated the trajectory of the Apollo 11 mission to the moon. The book also contains fascinating infographics and an illustrated scientific glossary. (Available from the School Library)

Lateness

The school starts with a form registration at 8.40 am. Pupils are expected to be in their form room by 8.35 am. Any pupil who arrives after this time is registered as late and minutes late will be recorded.

Pupils can access the school Library from 8am in the morning and their social areas from 8:15am. The school gates are closed at 8:40am and any pupil arriving after this time should sign in at Reception and a 'Late' mark will usually be given unless there are exceptionally circumstances, which we are made aware of prior to their arrival.

A pupil who arrives after 9.00am will be marked as an unauthorised absent for the morning session unless they have a genuine reason for lateness i.e. medical appointment. If a child arrives late to school due to a medical appointment, a copy of the appointment card should be supplied to the school, prior to, or on their arrival. In this case the absence will be recorded as an authorised absence.

It is the duty of parents to ensure that children attend school regularly and punctually. This encourages habits of good timekeeping and lessens any possible classroom disruption.

Where pupils are continually arriving after registers close at 9am, their attendance will be monitored and may result in a Penalty Notice being issued.

Please contact your <u>child's year team</u> if you have any concerns or if there are circumstances the school needs to be aware of that are having an influence on your child attending school punctually.

Medical Appointments

If your child is going to be absent from school due to a prearranged medical appointment, we ideally need notification of this 2 school days in advance. Please email

thecollege@cambournevc.org with the date and time of the appointment and if possible, a copy of the appointment letter/card.

All pupils leaving early for appointments need to be collected by a parent to sign them out through our main Reception.

Planned Absence Request

For any planned absence which is not a medical appointment, please complete a <u>planned absence</u> request form. If possible, please submit this form two weeks before the absence.

If your child has **lost an item of uniform**, please ask them to check with their **Year team office** in the first instance, or please **email <u>thecollege@cambournevc.org</u>** so that we can arrange for your child to check our unnamed items.

If your child needs a coat/jacket and would like to look through our unnamed items to find something suitable for them, please ask them to go to their Year team office or email the College.

COVID Testing - LFD testing

Why should my child take part in weekly screening?

- One third of infected individuals have no symptoms and unknowingly spread coronavirus infection. Community LFD testing is one method to help identify and then isolate those infected. This helps reduce the risk for others in the wider community who are more at risk of infection such as the elderly and those who have underlying health conditions, contacts that students and students families have outside of school.

- LFD testing is voluntary, and we respect any decision surrounding this however we would like to encourage this as much as possible

The weekly process

- Pupils should test on a WEDNESDAY and SUNDAY each week
- Results should be entered into TestRegister at TestRegister.co.uk

Changes to the self-isolation period for those who test positive for COVID-19

From Monday 17 January, people who are self-isolating with COVID-19 will have the option to reduce their isolation period after 5 full days if they test negative with a lateral flow device (LFD) test on both day 5 and day 6 and they do not have a temperature. For example, if they test negative on the morning of day 5 and the morning of day 6, they can return to their education immediately on day 6.

The first test must be taken no earlier than **day 5 of the self-isolation period**, and the second must be taken the following day. All test results should be reported to NHS Test and Trace.

If the result of either of their tests is positive, they should continue to self-isolate until they get negative results from two LFD tests on consecutive days or until they have completed 10 full days of self-isolation, whichever is earliest.

Anyone who is unable to take LFD tests or anyone who continues to have a temperature will need to complete the full 10 day period of self-isolation.
